(2) ...light blades. Do you know that they change color at night? Draw the light blades and color them in with your favorite color.

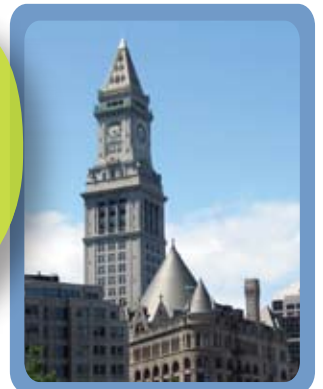

(3) ... a paver. Can you find the paver of the famous mother for whom this park is named? Now draw your own paver. Whose name would you write on it?



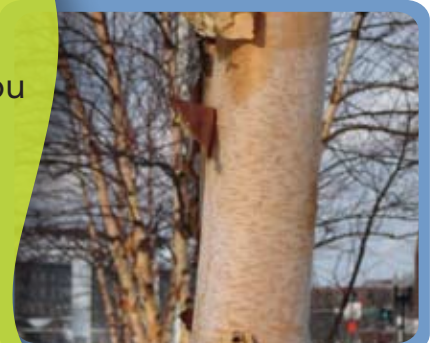

- (1) Designed by Boston artist Ross Miller, Harbor Fog features sculptural beacons, inspired by buoys, as well as a motion activated sound and "fog" system. The granite stones in the shape of a boat around the sculpture are recycled seawall stones from the Harbor.



- (2) 12 vertical glass and steel sculptures illuminate the Wharf District Parks with joyful colors every night. The LED lights can show up to 16.7 million different colors, along with an array of patterns, speed and intensity.



- (3) The Mother's Walk is a gently curving pathway that consists of pavers inscribed with names and personal messages from donors honoring someone they love. The very first paver in the pathway, near the Rings Fountain is Rose Kennedy's paver.



- (4) The Custom House Tower was built in the early 1900s and is currently Boston's 17th-tallest building. In the mid-1800s, Boston's waterfront extended right to this building.



- (5) The Wharf District features many trees, grasses and shrubs that are native to New England. While it is an engaging and rich experience to learn through touch, please be mindful of your children pulling or damaging the plants.
